## CRIME STATISTIC REPORT FORM

Employees designated as Campus Security Authorities by Babson College should promptly notify Babson Public Safety Department about crimes that may have occurred on Babson controlled property. Sex offenses, domestic violence, dating violence and stalking involving members of the Babson Community should be reported to the Title IX Coordinator or a Deputy Coordinator, who will complete this form as applicable. If an individual is unsure whether an incident should be reported to Public Safety, they should provide Public Safety with a brief description of the nature of the incident and where it was reported to have occurred so Public Safety can assess if the incident should be included as a crime statistic in the College's Annual Security Report (ASR).

<u>Individuals should immediately call Babson Public Safety at 781-239-5555 concerning any potential immediate threat of harm to the community or need for response from law enforcement</u>. ## Criminal Offenses that should be reported to Public Safety:

Murder/Non-Negligent Manslaughter: the willful (non-negligent) killing of one human being by another.

Manslaughter by Negligence: the killing of another person through gross negligence.

**Rape:** The penetration, no matter how slight, of the vagina or anus with any body part or object, or oral penetration by a sex organ of another person, without the consent of the victim. The definition of rape further includes intercourse with a person who is mentally incapacitated, unconscious, asleep, or physically incapable of consenting due to consumption of alcohol or other drugs.

Statutory Rape: Sexual intercourse with a person who is under the statutory age of consent. In Massachusetts, the statutory age of consent is 16 years old.

Incest: Sexual intercourse between persons related to each other within the degrees wherein marriage is prohibited bylaw.

**Fondling:** The touching of the private body parts of another person for the purpose of sexual gratification, without the consent of the victim, including instances where the victim is incapable of giving consent because of his/her age or because of his/her temporary or permanent mental or physical incapacity.

**Domestic Violence:** Felony or misdemeanor crimes of violence committed by a current or former spouse or intimate partner of the victim, by a person with whom the victim shares a child in common, by a person who is cohabitating with or has cohabitated with the victim as a spouse, by a person similarly situated to a spouse of the victim under the domestic or family violence laws of the jurisdiction receiving grant monies, or by any other person against an adult or youth victim who is protected from that person's acts under the domestic or family violence laws of the jurisdiction.

**Dating Violence:** Violence committed by a person who is or has been in a social relationship of a romantic or intimate nature with the victim and where the existence of such a relationship shall be determined based on a consideration of the following factors: the length of the relationship, the type of relationship, and the frequency of interaction between the persons involved in the relationship.

Stalking: Engaging in a course of conduct directed at a specific person that would cause a reasonable person to A. Fear for the person's safety or the safety of others or B. Suffer substantial emotional distress.

**Robbery**: the taking or attempting to take anything from value of the care, custody or control of a person or persons by force or threat of force or violence and/or by putting the victim in fear.

Aggravated Assault: an unlawful attack by one person upon another for the purpose of inflicting severe or aggravated bodily injury. This type of assault usually is accompanied by the use of a weapon or by means likely to produce death or great bodily harm. It is not necessary that injury result from an aggravated assault when a gun, knife or other weapon is used which could or probably would result in a serious potential injury if the crime were successfully completed.

**Burglary**: The unlawful entry of a structure to commit a felony or a theft. For reporting purposes this definition includes: unlawful entry with intent to commit a larceny or a felony; breaking and entering with intent to commit a larceny; housebreaking; safecracking; and all attempts to commit any of the aforementioned.

Motor Vehicle Theft: The theft or attempted theft of a motor vehicle. (Classify as motor vehicle theft all cases where automobiles are taken by persons not having lawful access, even though the vehicles are later abandoned - including joyriding)

**Arson**: The willful or malicious burning or attempt to burn, with or without intent to defraud, a dwelling house, public building, motor vehicle or aircraft, or personal property of another kind.

Weapon Law Violations: The violation of laws or ordinances dealing with weapon offenses, regulatory in nature, such as: manufacture, sale, or possession of deadly weapons; carrying deadly weapons, concealed or openly; furnishing deadly weapons to minors; aliens possessing deadly weapons; all attempts to commit any of the aforementioned.

*Drug Abuse Violations*: Violations of state and local laws relating to the unlawful possession, sale, use, growing, manufacturing, and making of narcotic drugs. The relevant substances include: opium or cocaine and their derivatives (morphine, heroin, codeine); marijuana; synthetic narcotics (Demerol, methadone); and dangerous non-narcotic drugs (barbiturates, Benzedrine).

*Liquor Law Violations:* The violation of laws or ordinance prohibiting: the manufacture, sale, transporting, furnishing, possessing of intoxicating liquor; maintaining unlawful drinking places; bootlegging; operating a still; furnishing liquor to minor or intemperate person; using a vehicle for illegal transportation of liquor; drinking on a train or public conveyance; all attempts to commit any of the aforementioned. (Drunkenness and driving under the influence are not included in this definition.)

## Hate Bias Related Crimes

Babson College is also required to report statistics for hate (bias) related crimes in their ASR, based on the type of bias, for Clery Act reportable crimes (listed above) as well as for the additional crimes of larceny, vandalism, intimidation or simple assault or other bodily injury. A hate or bias related crime is not a separate, distinct crime, but is the commission of a criminal offense which was motivated by the offender's bias against another person's race, religion, ethnicity, national origin, gender, sexual orientation, disability, or gender identity. If an incident involving larceny, vandalism, intimidation, simple assault or other bodily injury occurs on Babson -controlled property and appears motivated by hate bias, the statistic be reported as a hate crime even though there otherwise would be no requirement to report such crimes in the College's annual security report.

The definitions of larceny, vandalism, intimidation and simple assault used by Public Safety for purpose of ASR reporting are:

Larceny: The unlawful taking, carrying, leading, or riding away of property from the possession or constructive possession of another.

*Vandalism:* To willfully or maliciously destroy, injure, disfigure, or deface any public or private property, real or personal, without the consent of the owner or person having custody or control by cutting, tearing, breaking, marking, painting, drawing, covering with filth, or any other such means as may be specified by local law.

*Intimidation:* To unlawfully place another person in reasonable fear of bodily harm through the use of threatening words and/or other conduct, but without displaying a weapon or subjecting the victim to actual physical attack.

Simple Assault: An unlawful physical attack by one person upon another where neither the offender displays a weapon, nor the victim suffers obvious severe or aggravated bodily injury involving apparent broken bones, loss of teeth, possible internal injury, severe laceration or loss of consciousness.
