The officers in our junior year were: Len Smith, President; Craig Klocker, Vice-President; Steve Raches, Secretary; and Jack Garrity, Treasurer. Their administrative and social leadership brought us through the year with great success.

Many things made life most interesting: a beer-blast at Green Acres, a semi-formal at the Maugus Club. a beach party in Duxbury, and Ec. Theory. As June arrived, we were all chosing our majors, and the distribution men were lining up their summer selling jobs.

September, 1957, began the final phase of our education at Babson, with officers: Jack Garrity, President; Joe White, Vice-President; Bing Leonard, Secretary; and Dick Boutilier, Treasurer. The Fall got rolling with a semi-formal dance in Waltham.

Fall turned into Winter, and included in our curriculum was the course we had been aware of for 2 1 2 years, Industry Analysis. What with "agents," then suddenly lack of them, we managed to pull through the trying but rewarding ordeal with flying colors.

The event that capped our social life at Babson was the traditional Dinner-Dance, this year at the Commonwealth Country Club. This was important, for it symbolized, among other things, that graduation was only 5 weeks away.

We will always remember the three exciting Winter carnivals and the three fun-full Spring week-ends in which the entire student body participated. We will never forget the matters of financial nature during our senior year, and the ease with which the dues were collected!

Our three years at Babson Institute have given us inspiration, great enthusiasm, and most significantly. life-long associations. Upon entering the outside world, we are grateful to our instructors for preparing the way, and we wish each other the best of good fortune and happiness.


FIRST AND SECOND YEAR GRADUATE STUDENTS

Our First place in the President's Cup Award for all the chapters was displayed throughout the year at various meetings.



Socially, many fine parties were held to which the brothers and their guests were invited. To single one of these parties out as a highlight of the year would be an impossible task.






WINTER CAR

Although five lettermen will not return for the coming season, the team is confident that there will be considerable improvement over this year's scoreboard.







Despite a slow start, during which time


everyone was attempting to get his game into shape, the team finished strongly winning four out of its last six games.



The Sailing Club completed another active and participating year with twenty five members. The lake was the scene for many a pleasant afternoon of sailing.


