



"Gordon Trim was the best thing that ever happened to Babson Institute." These words of a faculty wife clearly reflect the feelings of all who knew and worked with Dr. Trim.

He was an uncomplicated, forthright, genuinely friendly personality with the patience of Job, yet as rugged in determination and character as the Maine coast from which he sprang. He played no roles, and he played no favorites. Students and staff alike knew where they stood with Gordon Trim. Fairness was his guiding principle.


Dr. Trim's greatest asset was his humility. He had no ego that needed kindling, either by students or faculty; he was no status seeker. What happened to other people was far more important than what happened to him. And because he was more interested in getting effective responses from others, and more devoted to building Babson than Gordon Trim, he was able to inspire a kind of team work among his staff seldom found in any organization. He knew how to delegate, and credit was readily given where credit was due.

Gordon Trim had mastered the art of listening, and because he was a good listener he knew a great deal about both his students and his faculty. He was tight-lipped, too; and because those who knew him best knew their problems would go no further than the confines of his office, he was sought out as counselor and confidant. Both as counselor and administrator he had a way of overlooking the other fellow's shortcomings; if he couldn't say something good about his fellowmen, he said nothing.


As an old semi-pro ball player, Gordon Trim had an insatiable interest in sports. It was the athlete in him, coupled with his concern that businessmen be fit, that gave us one of the finest physical educational plants to be found anywhere.

Neither Dr. Trim's home nor his office door was ever closed; those students and parents who sought him out found both a friend and an inspiration. They learned, too, that he was an unsurpassed spinner of folksy Maine yarns that were a delight to all.

Above all Gordon Trim believed resolutely in Babson Institute, the Babson program, and in Babson men. Babson was his raison d'etre to which he gave himself completely. Gordon Trim will be sorely missed, but he will live on forever in the hearts and minds of those who knew him.





Just the other evening I watched a chess game in progress; one student was always the aggressor; his moves were clean, calculated and devastating. Finally, in despair, his defeated opponent complained, "I'm just not very smart at this; I have little ability; you trap me in every move." The first player, the winner, observed, "You're just as smart as I am; in fact you're downright clever; your trouble is you never really plan ahead. Army Men lead the Pledge of Allegiance on Honors Day

It is a major part of the United States Army's program to send selected personnel to civilian universities; and, since 1954 Babson Institute has been selected as one of the nation's leading civilian educational institutions at which to train its future leaders in the fields of management and production. Under its present program ten Ordnance Corps officers are assigned each year for an accelerated eighteen-month advanced management course leading to a M.B.A. degree. These officers have their regular courses integrated with a summer assignment at the Army's Watertown Arsenal, a tour of local industrial facilities, and a fall program at the Army's Boston Ordnance District. Dr. Walter H. Carpenter, Jr., who is chairman of Babson's Division of Management and Production, is now directing the Army program.

For the most part these men have been placed in classes with graduate students, and their past education ranges from one year in college to four years at West Point. Those now holding Bachelors' degrees will receive Masters' degrees upon completion of the course, and those who do not hold undergraduate degrees may earn them by taking the required liberal art courses on their own either at Babson or elsewhere.

From Babson these officers move to three-year utilization tours in the management field with assignments as procurement officers, comptrollers, program coordinators, and operating managers in Ordnance. Activities range from research, design, production, procurement to combat support of fighting equipment. The variety of end-items extends from hand weapons through artillery, tanks, automotive vehicles, nuclear and conventional munitions to guided missiles and satellites. The Ordnance Corps has prime responsibility for the Army's fighting hardware. The Babson Institute Industrial Management Course under supervision of the Ordnance Training Command is aimed at increased efficiency and economy in defense activities. This is another example of Babson's many contributions to the vital defense of the nation.















Dad's Weekend marks another A K Psi first.




Fraternity Officers


STUDENT CABINET

B CLUB



INTERFRATERNITY COUNCIL




This past year, the council revised the fraternities'

SPORTS CAR CLUB







WIVES' CLUB


The Babson Student Wives Club is just what the title implies — "a club for the wives" — where many activities keep them busy throughout the school year.





All in all, these "extra" parties kept fraternity brothers at an unbelievable quick pace; most of them never seeing Monday.





Swimmers . . . Take your marks . . . Ready .


The swimming team compiled a record of six wins and two losses under the outstanding direction of Coach Gary Parks. The team, which consisted of eleven men, overwhelmed Southern Connecticut State College by the score of 60-20 in their first meet of the year. The Beavers extended their winning streak of five straight by beating Hartford University, Worchester Junior College, Worchester Y.M. C.A., and Holy Cross before losing to the Harvard Freshmen. The team rebounded strongly though, by swamping Assumption, 55-18.

Captain Tomas Fernandez was a strong performer in the individual medley and the 100 yard butterfuly while Manuel Navaro won consistently in the backstroke. Freshman Doug Robinson proved himself to be an outstanding swimmer in the freestyle events and showed great potential for the future. 

Once each year the outstanding accomplishments, both scholastic and extracurricular, are rewarded by public acknowledgement at the Honor's Day Assembly.

Paul C. Staake, Jr., faculty representative for student activities, and Thomas E. Smith, Director of Athletics, presented the following Athletic Awards.

The Ewart Memorial Swimming Trophy is awarded each year to the outstanding swimmer at the Institute. This year, the recipient was a freshman who was high point man in a recent all-college meet; and won the three events in which he was entered: the 50-yard Butterfly, the Diving, and the 100-yard Individual Medley. The proud recipient was George R. Wierdsma. The second athletic award, was the Intramural Championship Punchbowl. The goal of intramural competition is the Punchbowl which is awarded annually to the team accumulating the greatest number of points in all intramural competition. This year Bryant Hall had finished first in basketball, swimming, squash, and tennis, and second in touch football, and in so doing had accumulated sufficient points to cinch the title for them. Bruce W. Thomas, Athletic Representative from Bryant Hall, received this trophy in behalf of his group. The last athletic award presented was the Senior Athletic Award. This year's recipient, Kenneth R. Polhemus has many fine qualities. Among them are leadership, ability, desire, sportsmanship, self-discipline and determination. Dr. Henry A. Kriebel, Dean of Faculty, now assisted Mr. Staake for scholarship and student activity awards. At the suggestion of Blue Key, a committee of the administration was selected to nominate worthy Babson men to be listed in "Who's Who Among Students in American Universities and Colleges." The criteria to be used by this committee in the selection included, scholarship above the all-college average, demonstrated leadership, active participation in extracurricular affairs, and good citizenship. Those elected to this high honor were, E. Michael Brown, Harvey H. Feldman, Erlon R. Grant, Arthur J. Kreib, Booth R. Martin, and Don R. Ziegenbein. Six members of this year's graduating class have been deemed worthy by the awards committee of receiving the Student Activities Award. They were first made at the suggestion of presidents of the campus organizations as a means of encouraging extracurricular activities, improving campus morale, and increasing worthwhile college activity. Just as recognition of success in academic work takes place through the publication of a Dean's List and the awarding of degrees with distinction; and recognition for achievement in the athletic program is provided through the presentation of trophies, letters, and other awards, so the third phase of college life is most fittingly recognized in these awards, first suggested and presented through the joint efforts of the students themselves. The recipients that have demonstrated their loyalty to the ideals of Babson Institute are, E. Michael Brown, Harvey H. Feldman, Erlon R. Grant, Arthur J. Kreib, Ronald C. Perry, and Don R. Ziegenbein. The Alumni Association Award is presented to the undergraduate who has shown the greatest business initative for the current year in initiating and conducting a personal business and illustrating the business acumen expected of a Babson graduate. The recipient was John H. Schiavi. Dr. Kriebel, the brothers of Blue Key have felt for some time that further recognition other than the publication of a Dean's List should be afforded those men each year who have achieved outstanding academic records. Most of the established scholarship awards go only to the top men in the graduating class. Twenty three men were taken into Beta Gamma. Each year the Wall Street Journal Student Achievement Award is presented to the senior who in the opinion of the faculty of the Division of Finance has written the most distinguished academic record in this field. Don R. Ziegenbein was the honored recipient. Each year Alpha Delta Sigma, a national advertising fraternity on our campus, presents an award in honor of Henry L. Russell, a deceased brother. The Alpha Delta Sigma Hank Russell Memorial Award goes to a senior majoring in the field of Distribution who, in the opinion of the faculty members of this Division, seems most likely to succeed in view of his past achievement in Distribution. Frederick J. Klauer, III presented himself on the platform to receive this worthy award. Alpha Kappa, Psi, Delta Sigma Pi, and Ford Scholarship Awards, awards a scholarship key at each of the institutions represented by a chapter to the senior who

upon completion of at least three-fourths of his college work ranks at the top of his class. Thus the award may be won by September and December graduates, as well as by those who receive their degrees in March or June. The first two awards receive nation wide recognition and the latter was established through the generosity of Caroll W. Ford, a former member of our faculty. This year one man has qualified for all three awards — Don R. Ziegenbein presented himself to receive these awards. In an open letter to the Class of 1952, the late George Macy Wheeler, former member of the Babson Institute faculty, selected the following qualities as most likely to ensure progress and personal happiness: Naturalness, sincerity, friendliness, persistence, and loyalty. Reflecting the clear light of rare justice, these are the very qualities that distinguished George Macy Wheeler and made him our best-loved counselor and teacher. It is as though unwittingly he held a mirror up to nature and, wishing to help others, unconsciously revealed himself. No more fitting tribute to his memory could be imagined that to select annually as recipient of the George Macy Wheeler Memorial Award the student who best represents on our campus the qualities that endeared our friend to all who knew him. Harvey H. Feldman became the proud recipient of this award. A group of students, in 1947, conceived an award which they voted to call the Roger W. Babson Achievement Award in honor of Mr. Babson. This award, a bronze trophy, is made annually to the senior who in the opinion of a faculty committee has excelled in scholarship, student activities, and leadership. The committee weighs the achievement of each member of the senior class to determine the man who they feel demonstrated the best all-around performance in these areas. Don R. Ziegenbein received this award, and was the last recipient to receive a scholastic award at this assembly.

This memorable occasion was brought to a close by the singing of the Babson Hymn by the Glee Club and the audience partook in the singing
