POL4606 ANCIENT ATHENS AND THE BIRTH OF POLITICAL THOUGHT SUMMER SESSION; PROF. KRISTOFER PETERSEN-OVERTON

ABOUT THE COURSE

This study abroad class in Athens and beyond will explore the political thought of ancient Greece through an examination of philosophical taxts, archaeological slass, and historical monuments. Perioles famously called Athens the Tachool of Hellas, underscoring the city's role as a leader in the Greek world and a hub of artistic cultural, and philosophical innovation. Indeed, the city not only plonesed theatre, potting the way for our own forms of popular entartainment, it also made important contributions to architecture, potter, and aculpture. But it is in the realm of politics and philosophism thathen secured onsurpassed greatness. Dimig its Soliden Age, Athens produced the first—and argusably the most radical—democracy the world has known. The practice of Athenian democracy and the real power it gave to ordinary citizens raised important philosophical questions, above all: Who should rule—and why? Today, many of our most basic political ideas and viocabulary come to us from Creeks: "politics," "democracy," "leanerly," "monarchy," "transcript," "monare a few.

Beneath the Acropolis, in the shade of cypresses and alive groves, thinkers like Socrates, Plato, and Aristotis eaked enduring guastions about justice, power, and the good life. In this course, we will examine these ideas at the after where this remarkable instancy unfolded. We will discuss the trial of Socrates in the ancient Agora, where he famously declared. The unexamined life is not worth living. We will wait in the footstase of philosophers at the Acropolis, explore the Karamelkos where Pericles honored the Atherian dead, and run in the very stadium where the original Crymplans once sought glory. Well stand before the Temple of Olymplan Zeus, marvel at the perfectly preserved theater of Epidaurus, and perhaps even seek guidance from the Cracle at Delphi, as generations of seakers did before us...

Our philosophical journey will begin with several days in and around Athens before confinuing to the Peloponness. Beyond the famous Athenian landmarks (including the Parthenon, the Acropolis, the Karamelkos, the Ancient Agors, the Theatre of Bionyaus, and the Panathenale Stadium), our filterary includes atops at Sourion, Leurion, Marathon, Rhamnous, the Corinth Canal, Mycanes, Epidaurus, Dlympia, and Delphi. We will also explore the charming coastal town of Nafpilo (the first cepital of modern Greece), indulips in a food tour of modern Greek cuisine, and enjoy zome beach outings. The course will conclude with a day trip to the picturesque Island of Aegins.


