Babson College Campus Walking Tour



Hello, and welcome to Babson College! We are happy to have you visit our beautiful campus and have put together a list of "must see" spots for your walking tour.



The Arthur M. Blank Center for Entrepreneurship

The first stop on our tour is the Blank Center for Entrepreneurship. The Blank Center is named after Arthur M. Blank, co-founder of Home Depot, owner of the Atlanta Falcons, and proud Babson alumnus, class of 1963. The Blank Center is home to the world's largest dedicated entrepreneurship faculty and the hub for programming and support for Babson entrepreneurs. One of the Center's biggest annual events is the B.E.T.A. (Babson Entrepreneurial Thought & Action) Challenge, which embodies Babson's entrepreneurial spirit and recognizes the progress and potential of Babson ventures. Winners in each track – Undergraduate, Graduate and Alumni – each win \$28,000, along with in-kind donations from sponsors. If you're reading this and thinking, "I'm not ready to start my own company," don't worry. At Babson we believe that Entrepreneurial Thought & Action will guide you in whatever career path you choose!



Park Manor West

Park Manor West is both a residence hall and academic building. Students live in double or triple rooms with shared bathrooms on each floor and the building is staffed by six resident assistants (RAs) and an area coordinator. Park Manor West is also home to the Leonard A. Schlesinger Innovation Center, named after Babson's 12th president, which features an amphitheater, classroom and collaboration space for students in Foundations of Management and Entrepreneurship (FME). FME is a year-long course required of all first-year students. With guidance from two professors, students develop, launch, and manage a new venture, and learn how to work in a team, navigate obstacles and see a plan through completion. Some businesses succeed, and others don't, but most students cite FME as one of their most valued learning experiences at Babson.



Park Manor Quad

Park Manor Quad is surrounded by four undergraduate residence halls, which primarily house first-year students. The Quad is an important aspect of social life here on campus and hosts many of the orientation events in the fall semester, as well as our club fairs. On nice days you will see students playing frisbee, kicking around a soccer ball, or having lunch outside. It's a favorite spot for students to gather and enjoy nice weather and the beautiful Babson campus.



Kerry Murphy Healey Park

Babson's diverse student body includes students from 42 states and 28% international students representing 74 countries. Kerry Murphy Healey Park is surrounded by 100 flags representing the global diversity and mindset of our campus community. The flags flown reflect the countries of our international student population and are adjusted based on enrolled students at the start of the fall semester and again in early spring. At the center is the Babson World Globe, which has been a landmark on campus since 1955. It was moved across campus to this location and completely restored as part of the College's Centennial in 2019.



Trim Dining Hall

Trim is an all-you-can-eat-style dining hall, with dining stations that range from American "comfort food" to cuisine from around the world. There's also a dedicated vegan station, a major-allergen-free area, and regional-inspired options that incorporate local produce. If you're living on campus you are required to be on a meal plan. Meal plans consist of unlimited 15 meal swipes or 10 meal swipes per week. In addition to meal swipes, students have dining dollars and bonus meals that can be used at other dining facilities on campus. Attached to Trim is Roger's Pub, named for the College's founder, Roger Babson. Babson was a well-known prohibitionist so it seemed fitting to name the campus pub in his honor!

Students can use dining dollars at other dining options on campus including Dunkin', Centennial Café, which includes Starbucks, and Olin Café. Bonus meals can be used at the Crossroads Café in Reynolds Campus Center for meal options like sandwiches, salads, burrito bowls, and other lighter fare.



Weissman Foundry

Weissman Foundry opened in the Fall of 2018. It is an open-door design studio that fosters innovative collaboration between Babson, Olin, and Wellesley students, better known as the BOW Consortium. Students from all three colleges can use this space and its equipment, including laser cutters, sewing machines, 3D printers, a kitchen, and more. Students from all three colleges serve as mentors to help fellow students learn how to use the equipment available here. The BOW Consortium makes Babson a small school with big school benefits. Through BOW, students can cross register at Olin and Wellesley College. Babson students can earn a certificate of engineering from Olin College by completing five classes there. And, for students who want more exposure to the liberal arts, Wellesley College offers programs ranging from languages to sciences and more.





Reynolds Campus Center, Greek Life, and Specialty Housing

Reynolds Campus Center is the campus hub of Babson College. Inside Reynolds, you will find Dunkin', Crossroads Café, the College Bookstore, and the mail room. Connected to Reynolds is Hollister Hall, which houses Health Services, the Dean's Office, and the Center for Career Development.

Reynolds is part of Middle Campus, which includes upperclassmen housing and specialty interest housing. Specialty interest housing is open to any group on campus who would like to live together in a housing unit. This includes Greek life and many other organizations such as ONE (Origins of Necessary Equality), E-Tower for budding entrepreneurs, and the Healthy Living Tower, among others. Approximately 20% of Babson students are involved in Greek Life, which includes two social fraternities, three social sororities, and three business fraternities. There are many other clubs and organizations on campus including BDE (Babson Dance Ensemble), which is the largest organization at Babson.



Sorenson Center for the Arts

Babson students' interests and talents are diverse, and many pursue their love of the arts at the Richard W. Sorenson Center for the Arts. Sorenson Center includes the Carling-Sorenson Theater, a beautiful 441-seat proscenium theater and the Sandra L. Sorenson Rehearsal Studio that is used for rehearsals and performances. Sorenson hosts BabsonARTS, Babson Players, cultural groups including AMAN and BAPSA, and many guest lectures and performances throughout the year.



Glavin Family Chapel

The Glavin Family Chapel opened in 1997 as a nondenominational sanctuary that welcomes people of all faiths, cultures, and traditions. It is an open, peaceful space with a wall of windows overlooking the beautiful woods behind it. The Chapel can accommodate up to 150 people and is used for religious club meetings, Saturday morning church, Friday night Shabbat, Muslim prayer rooms, peace circles, and more.



Babson Commons and Horn Library

Babson Commons opened in 2019 as a new space for the Babson community to convene. It is home to the Centennial Café and the Bala Iyer Garden, a beautiful four-season garden named in honor of the late and beloved dean of faculty. Babson Commons also houses the Cutler Center for Investments and Finance, including a state-of-the-art finance lab with 42 Bloomberg Fact Set workstations. The Cutler Center is where students take upper-level finance courses, including the Babson College Fund, an accredited course in which undergraduate and graduate students manage 5 million dollars of the Babson College endowment.

Babson Commons serves as the entryway to Horn Library, which operates across three floors. The first floor is designated for group and social learning, while the second and third floors are quieter and offer space for more individualized learning. In addition to its in-house resources, Horn Library also participates in an interlibrary loan system that provides students access to resources from a number of university and public libraries in the area. Horn Library is also home to several student resource centers, including the Math Resource Center, the Speech Center, SPARK Tutoring, and the Writing Center. These are all free services for students and offer skill development and support in foundation-level courses.



Len Green Recreation and Athletic Complex

The Len Green Recreation and Athletic Complex (LGRAC) houses a recreation center with three courts for basketball, badminton, volleyball, tennis, and more, a two-level fitness center with strength and cardio equipment, a 25-yard indoor pool, an indoor track, a dance studio, two squash courts, a racquetball court, and full locker rooms with access to showers. Students can also take advantage of group fitness classes and personal training.

Babson is a NEWMAC Division III school with 23 varsity teams. There are 11 men's teams and 12 women's teams including the newest addition, women's golf. Babson also offers 18 clubs sports and intramural sports ranging from flag football and indoor soccer to cricket and pickleball.



The Herring Family Entrepreneurial Leadership Village #1

The Herring Family Entrepreneurial Leadership Village (ELV) is a place—both physical and virtual—where the Babson community, extended ecosystem, and people around the world come together to learn, collaborate, and take action. Extensive renovations of a portion of the Babson Executive Conference Center (BECC) are currently underway to create the future home of the ELV. This space will include classrooms, space for collaboration, a café, and housing for the ELV living-learning community.
